Principal Leadership has been a focus of Fry Foundation Education funding since FY2012. This is because effective principals are essential to improving instruction and academic outcomes for all students. As schools navigate through pandemic recovery, principals are more important than ever. This year, the Wallace Foundation published a report analyzing two decades of

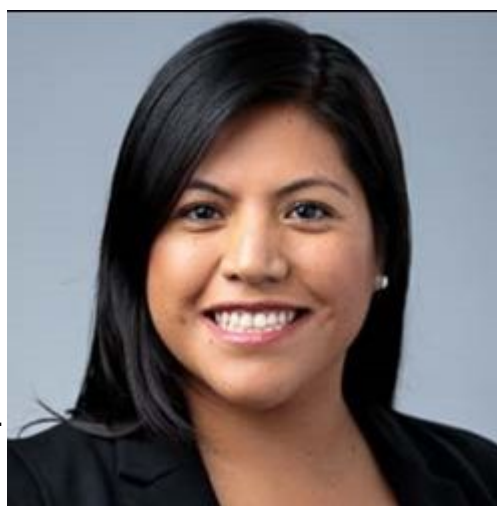
research on the impact of school principals. We were not surprised to learn that the influence of school principals has been understated. Across six studies on principal effectiveness the principals' contribution to student achievement was nearly as large as the average effects of teachers. Principals' effects, however, are broader in scope because they are averaged over all students in a school rather than a single classroom. Congratulations to long-time grantee Steppenwolf Theater for the opening of the new Liz and Eric Lefkowsky Arts and Education Center. The fourth floor, also known as The Loft, is a new home for all of Steppenwolf Education's



programming. The Loft includes spaces for a range of programs for teachers and students to engage in creative experiences. Programs include Teen Programs, Educator Training Programs, and the Loft Teen Arts Projects.

The State of the Arts in Chicago Public Schools Progress Report 2019-20

For the past eight years, Ingenuity has provided Chicago Public Schools and the arts education sector with The State of the Arts in Chicago Public Schools (SOTA). This annual report tracks student access to arts education in Chicago Public Schools and helps identify areas for improvement and growth. The data for these reports comes from CPS administrative sources, from CPS schools, and directly from arts partner organizations that support CPS



students. The 2019-20 State of the Arts report employs a new scoring method that offers more detail on arts offerings and presents new ideas about how to use this information to drive improvements in access and quality of arts instruction.

Key Findings:

- 87% of elementary schools rated as Excelling and 92% rated as Excelling or Strong in providing access to arts instruction.
- 65% of schools rated as Excelling in providing appropriate levels of art staffing and 82% are rated as either Excelling or Strong
- Budgets for the arts decreased both in elementary and high schools
- There was a 20% reduction in the number of arts partners identified as working in one or more CPS schools.

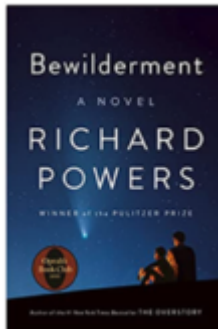

In addition to health services, the Broadway Youth Center offers education, employment, and youth development. 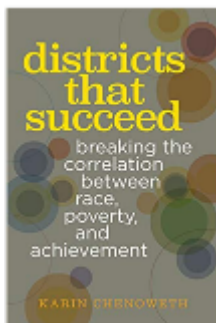

Districts That Succeed: Breaking the Correlation Between Race, Poverty, and Achievement

Education reported Karin Chenoweth looks closely at five school districts, including Chicago Public Schools, that have cracked the correlation between race, poverty, and achievement. The book identifies the common practices in high performing or rapidly improving districts that serve children of color and children from low-income backgrounds, including leadership, processes, and systems. *Districts That Succeed* reiterates that helping more students achieve is not a matter of adopting a single program or practice. Rather, it requires developing a district-wide culture where all adults feel responsible for the academic well-being of students and adopt systems and processes that support that culture.
